

#### **DESCRIPTION**

This activity will help you to understand the social dimension of sustainable agriculture and identify opportunities for improvement on your own farm.





### THE ACTIVITY

Complete a self-assessment questionnaire that includes questions related to the social dimension of sustainable agriculture:

- 1. How do you ensure fair and safe working conditions for all employees on your farm?
- 2. How do you engage and involve the local community in your farm operations?
- 3. How do you ensure that your farm operations do not negatively impact the local community?
- 4. How do you ensure that your farm operations are inclusive and equitable for all stakeholders?
- 5. How do you ensure that your farm operations respect the rights of indigenous peoples and local communities?
- 6. How do you ensure that your farm operations promote social and economic development in the local community?
- 7. After answering all the questions think about your answers, take new paper and set goals to improve in areas identified as opportunities for improvement.

## THE THEORY

#### SOCIAL DIMENSION OF SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE
